

How Are Electronics Recycled?

Computers are recycled through a process called "demanufacturing." CPUs, monitors and peripherals are evaluated; the few units suitable for refurbishing are processed and sold as pre-owned computers. Other electronics are dismantled; hazardous and precious metals are removed for sale or proper disposal. Parts, such as memory chips, video cards, soundboards and mother boards are sold for reuse; other materials such as the computer's plastic case, wood from TV consoles and remaining metal are sold as scrap.

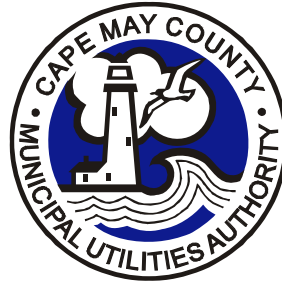

Rechargeable Batteries have hazardous components and must be recycled. Visit www.call2recycle.org to find a nearby drop off location or bring them to the CMCMUA TS or SLF. Single use disposable batteries do not have hazardous components. Dispose of single use batteries with regular trash.

MUST BE RECYCLED...

Effective January 1, 2011, the New Jersey Electronic Waste Management Act P.L. 2008 c. 130, prohibits the landfilling of these consumer electronics.

When discarded electronics are responsibly recycled:

Finite natural resources are conserved,

Toxic waste is reduced, and

Landfill space is saved for future use.

1) WHO: Cape May County residents, businesses, municipalities, public and private institutions, agencies and schools.

2) WHAT: Computers, monitors laptops and all peripherals, TVs, VCRs, telephones, radios & other consumer electronics.

3) WHERE: CMCMUA Transfer Station (TS) in Burleigh and Landfill Complex (SLF) in Woodbine.

4) WHEN: During normal operating hours. See back of flyer.

5) HOW: Bring electronics to the TS or SLF, or contact your municipality to ask about collection or a drop-off location.

6) Fee: Consumer electronics accepted at no charge.

ALL ELECTRONICS SHOULD BE CLEAN AND FREE OF DEBRIS.

Brochures, instruction manuals and corrugated boxes should be recycled with other paper, not with electronics.

ARE ELECTRONICS COLLECTED CURBSIDE WITH OTHER RECYCLABLES?

Do not put electronics in containers with mixed paper or commingled cans and bottles. However, some towns have a separate collection service or provide a local drop-off site. Call your municipal recycling office:
