Additional Recyclables – CMCMUA Recycling Programs for:

Mixed Rigid Plastic (MRP) – Customers are encouraged to recycle clean loads of mixed rigid plastics (MRPs). Examples of MRPs are: Plastic laundry baskets, buckets with metal handles, lawn furniture, flower pots, toys, garbage cans, and milk and soda crates. MRPs are accepted at the Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill FREE.

Paint – Accepted ONLY at the CMCMUA's Transfer Station in Middle Township. "Paint" means: Water based, oil-based, latex, stain, varnish, shellac, polyurethane, lacquer, enamel, boat bottom paint, wood / masonry sealer, wood preservative and aerosol cans that contain any of the above. Empty paint cans should be placed in regular trash. A fee of \$1.25/gallon can and \$6.25/5 gallon can, will be charged. Smaller paint cans and aerosol cans are accepted free.

Electronics – Computers, monitors, TVs and other consumer electronics are accepted at the Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill in Woodbine FREE.

Tires – Residents may bring up to five (5) light duty tires (no truck tires) to the CMCMUA Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill. The charge is \$3.00 per tire. Truck loads of tires are accepted at the Sanitary Landfill for a fee of \$225.00/ton.

Used Motor Oil, Oil Filters & Antifreeze – Residents may bring up to five (5) gallons of motor oil and/or antifreeze and up to five (5) used motor oil filters per day to the CMCMUA Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill FREE.

Batteries – Auto and marine lead acid batteries are accepted FREE at the CMCMUA Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill. Small rechargeable batteries are recycled at Retail drop off sites. For locations, visit www.call2recycle.org or call 877-723-1297. Single use alkaline batteries (AAA, AA, C, D, etc.) are disposed of in regular trash.

Vegetative Recyclables – Accepted ONLY at the Sanitary Landfill are: Leaves and Grass Clippings for a fee of \$10.00/ton; Brush, Tree Branches & Limbs for a fee of \$33.00/ton; Stumps & Logs for a fee of \$12.00/ton. Natural Christmas trees are accepted FREE at the Sanitary Landfill and Transfer Station between December 27th and January 31st.

Propane Tanks – The CMCMUA Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill accept EMPTY 20 & 30lb. propane tanks for a fee of \$7.00 per tank.

Other Accepted Materials – The Transfer Station and Sanitary Landfill accept Scrap Metal, White Goods, and Wood Pallets FREE. **Freon containing** White Goods are accepted for a **fee of \$10.00/unit**.

Safe Needle Disposal – Call Cape Regional Medical Center at (609) 463-2491.

Do not dispose of needles in the trash or recycling.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day is held twice a year on a Saturday in May and in September. Visit www.cmcmua.com for more information.

Call your municipality to ask about curbside collection or a local drop-off area for any of the above materials.
